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# **Southern Lights Schooner**



**Paul Cousins** made this beautiful boat, "**Southern lights**". It is a 48 inch LOA, it's hull and deck is made from 4mm<sub>2</sub> Kauri planking. The fittings are made from copper and brass, the mast and spas are made of Oregon. The sails were made by Paul's wife Janice, out of polycotton material.



For the final finish on the deck and hull he applied five coats of two pot epoxy varnish. The Schooner carries 10lbs of lead in the keel. It has a two-channel radio and all sails are able to be trimmed together. Paul was delighted with the way she sailed.


### Fleetwing mystery

## Classic A Class yacht



#### HIGHLANDER A CLASS "WILLIAM FRASER"

This classic A Class, a Highlander, was one of several produced by Cooke Brothers (Boat builders then) who produced a mould for the hulls. Clarrie Gorrie, who was the Club Commodore for many years, moulded the lead ballast (boat weighs 60 lbs!). The first boats were all vane controlled and raced in pairs on a round-robin basis. Euan Sarginson took over Clarrie's boat and set about converting it to radio control.


He had a plan behind all this, Project X, to sail it across Cook Strait! Peter Vincent and I were coerced into helping. Peter made fittings and a special cradle to lower the boat into the water from the chase boat, Tauwera, owned by William Lee. Needless to say, this project was very successful, a shark followed the model, we survived tidal falls and the Cook Strait ferries, gave an interview to National Radio and made it into Wellington.

Euan appointed me custodian of the model before he died. I know of two other Highlanders, owned by Peter Vincent and Chris Koskela. There are others out there too.

Currently, the boat has two rigs, a standard working rig and a 4'6" rig with its "pink knickers jib"! This is a huge rig that helps the heavy model in light conditions.

Sadly on its last outing the boat was suffering from neglect, covered in cobwebs and dust, the radio gear dodgy, some urgent work needed! It takes two able bodies to launch and retrieve "William Fraser", a boat not to be messed with!
