Our mate Bert Willemse shows us some intriguing pics to "tantalise" us. It so happens his very tidy Noelex 25, so familiar on Lyttelton waters, was called :""tantalise"- I can feel an explanation coming on, so here goes! — 'twas winter 2016, Monday 30 May at Lake Ferry. It was a brisk southwester and cold at 11 degrees c max.- how do I know all this stuff? Years ago I started keeping a diary — why? Cos I had to admit I was getting old and starting to forget stuff.. There are certain things like wedding anniversaries, birthdays, and when you last changed your socks that you should not forget. — There were only five of us sailing on that day and it was a gusty wind belting down from the Bridle path. A brace of gusts caught No. 218 on a square run from the very distant top mark. Gust 1 pushed the bow down deep and 2 forced it much deeper and, o dear! she filled and gracefully disappeared!

In spite of the conditions the rescue boat was launched and two intrepid sailors, Bryan Pearce and Jim Patterson, endeavoured to drag for it but without success. Next day dawned cold, damp and only eight degrees and Bert had arranged a casting contest! After a long try Brian snagged something solid. Success? The end of the fishing line was secured and hidden and we all went home cold and a bit weary – Friday 3rd June was a lovely still sunny day.



I went early, but the WPP salvage company were already there. The rescue vessel was launched the crew having on board a very long handled hook, and soon by carefully following the line, they found the boat "lo and behold" they brought J-218 ashore.

You can imagine the relief. I am incredibly grateful to those guys for all that they did.-Such are the joys of sailing but to me the most important benefit of our activity is the joy of companionship. - A court of enquiry exonerated the captain of any fault as he was not on board at the time however the engineer was blamed for a hatch cover which was inadequate for its proper function.
